In 2019, an action was completed by the RPPDG whereby the group agreed on definitions to describe incidents and the communications relating to the nature of the work of the PDG, whereby to wording of "suspected persecution incidents & confirmed persecution incidents" were agreed by all members to describe areas of business. Furthermore, the word persecution is used wider than bird of prey crime when referring to wildlife crime. There are references across the spectrum, from civil society, enforcement and government.
